

July 28. 1944.

Americans continue their drive through the towns of St. Gilles and Marigny in an effort to reach Coutance and cut off approx; five divisions of the ememy. Good weather and fair skies make this a field day for our troops. Enemy tanks by the dozen are found knocked out, many of these were knocked out by the air attacks and many more by our advancing forces.

Refugees returning to their towns find their homes in ruins, a knocked out German tank is almost the only thing left. Children and their parents are sitting on their meagre belongings waiting for help. GU's of types and of several children. The little girl with the long hair was wounded.

At St. Gilles three tanks all within a few yards of each other are shown knocked out. Officers keep a record and check the effectiveness of our fire on these tanks. Also check to see if the Masis have any new wrink es.

CU's of two Lt. Cols inspecting tanks.

One officer finds a booby trap in one of the tanks.

This is a story on the new mine encountered in this area by the SOLD Division troops in the advance on St. Savuer Lendelin. The have been encountered before, but not in such profusion. They caused great casualties in the posts Inf. Regts. first oursucesoful attack on the island upon which the town of Seves is situated. This attack took place on the 22nd and 23rd of July 1944. This morning, 27 July, the troops of Co. 1, 559th Inf. Regt. retook the town with very little opposition but found very number numerous booby-traps and mines. This mine is anti-personnel and is found everywhere, in hedges, in fields and byried in the ground and in the roads. It is built to resemble a comman "C" ration can that has been used even to blackening the sides, as if coffee has been boiled in it, hence the susceptability of our troops, it detonates under very little pressure and is made to main, usually blowing off a hand or foot. The film shows the first wan squad of the Fish Engrs. Co. C.k attached to the coth Div., that entered Seves and swept the road clear. They are moving on forward to the advance for our vehicles, the first robl is uncontrolled and consists of medium and long shots of the squad moving. The second roll is controlled and shows Pvt. Everett R. Eusted, Weston, Ohio, of the same Co/ demonstrating how the mines are removed and shows the mine itself in detail. The second roll is intended to be cutin the first roll.

Periers, Normandy, France is one of the larger towns that is in line with a new allied armor drive. After a concerted bombing attack and also an artillery attack, the Atth Armored Division entered the shambles of a picturesque town. The tanks, Armored Cars, etc., roll through the town to establish a spear head furthers south. First prisoners are taken in the vicinity and are searched and placed in an improvised P.O.W. camp. Equipment passing through Periers with wrecked buildings in the background is shown from a number of angles including one that was taken from the bottom of a large bomb crater on a street inter-section.

As a preliminary to an attack on the centre of the line south of Caumont an attack was made by heavies on the areas in which the mine main enemy forces were believed to be located. Fragmentation bombs were used in most places to avoid cratering holding up our own movement. There was, however, some N.E.

The bombers came below cloud and provided a remarkable spectacle of dozens of four engined aircraft milling around just above the trees. Spitfires provided cover, many of them also flying around in the general meloc. There appeared to be very little flak indeed.

DESCRIPTION

The occupation of the key town of Coutances by the Armored forces of the 14th Armid Div. Driving shead with tanks and other vehicles they drove into and beyond the city of Coutances. Footage on some of the Ath Armid Div., soldiers c arefully making their way into the town which the German's pulled out of. Other than an occasional pocket resistance or a sniper there were no Jerries in the city. Footage on the Armored Division going through the town and the terrific demage and des truction in the town, which was caused by our bombers and artillery. Some of the first prisoners being brought back from the of the first prisoners being brought back from the frojt through the city of Coutances. Armored convoy and some human interest shots of the few remaining French priests in the town. As one entered the town from the St. Lo road there was a line of trees on both sides of the street. The germans cut notches in the frees and set dynamite charges in them. when the charges were set off the trees toppled into the street forming a road block. There is some foot-age on the town of Periers and engineer outfits re-Rolls 6 & 7 (Montgomery) Time 1200 Hours, Views of tanks on the St. Lo road leading to Coutance Follow up shots of the German Armor knocked out at a cross roads. German corpse in the foreground. Soldiers of the 1th Arm'd Div., working their way into the town of Coutances on the sharp look out for a German spiper, who had just fired a shot at them. Dynamite charged, line of trees, which when set off topples the trees and forms a road block. Trees in foreground and convoy of tanks etc., on main street leading into town. Shots of convoy. Rolls 8 & 9 (Montgomery) Time 1330 Hours. Shots of convoy moving through town showing the battered Cathedral of Coutances in the background. GU's of tenks and other Armored vehicles going by and blasted church in background. Prisoners being taken back to the rear, riding on hood of jeep, past convoy Troops marching by Armored Convoy in Coutances.
Rolls 10 & 11. (Montgomery) Time 1430 Hours.
Patrol mopping up the town of Coutances, walking over the debris which littered the streets. A small statue of the Virgin Mary was sitting atop a pile of rubble and patrol walking past it to square of Goutances. Various scenes of the Cathedral of Contances in the center of the town. Soldiers walking pest the Cathedral. French people watching convoy go by, these people had just returned to the city Scene of Jerry prisoners sitting on wall along street in Coutances. These were under guard here, prior to being sent back to the rear. Roll 12 (Montgomery.) Time 1500 Hours. Jerry prisoners lined up near wall in city of Coutances and Armored Convoy in the background.

The Germans pulled out of the town and our Armored forces drove south. down to and beyond the city of Contances. The engineers at work in Periers, showing the extensive damage to the town. Other follow shots Roll 2 (Hedrich) Time 1300 Hours. First 50 Feet Engineer demolitions work in the city of Periers. Engineers preparing to demolish a crumbling wall in the town. Other views on this sequence. /Sequence on the damage etc., to the twen of St. Sauveur Lendelyn on the road south to Coutances. The last 50 Feet on this roll is general views of devastated town of St. Sauveur. Roll 3 (Hedrich) Time 1530 hours. Sequence on the tanks and other Armored vehicles approaching and entering the city of Coutances from the North, Tank column passing tree lined street. Follow up shots of the Ath Armored Division passing through the town of Coutaines. Returning French refugees cheering and waving to the Armored Convoy in the city of Coutances.

All three rolls show the tremedous amount of equipment and men that passed through St. Lo. to day. Starting with some light and medium tanks that came tearing through the town to avert the steady 88mm fire the Germans had been throwing at St. LO, a steady stream of guns equipment and infantry kept coming from the North. The tanks went South East to hold off any counter attack while the equipment went south Nest. The tanks belong to the 737 tank Bn. Most of the vehicles in the first two rolls belong to the 2th Dik. All of the infantry and equipment in roll three belongs to the 2th Div. The MP (CU) directing traffic at the start of roll three is 1st. Sgt. Frank C. Rocco, from St. Albans, L.I. New York of Co. C. 207 MP En.
