In the failing light of the second half, the Australians' superior energy and team-work told. From 60 yards out, Walker gathered the ball and scored a second try in the far corner.

The Wallabies get away again. This time it was Cecil Winden, who with 3 men after him scored a brilliant breakaway try.

Tomkin makes the score 11:0. By not conceding a single try the Wallabies set-up a new international record.
