Thankyou for drinking my health, and for the manner in which you have all responded to the toast. Thank you also for your reference to my husband who, in his capacity, is what might be described as a multiple colonel-in-chief. (Laughter). He has asked me to tell you how very sorry he is not to be here tonight. (Applause). It is a real pleasure for me and so many of my family to be entertained by the Army on this great occasion, in this beautiful and famous hall, and in the company of the representatives of all the regiments and corps of the British Army. (90 ft.)

The British Army, more perhaps than any in the world, has always lived through the regiment and the regimental traditions. (Applause) In the hour of battle, it has repeatedly relied on it's pride and comradeship of men who would sooner die than betray the traditions of their Corps or be unworthy to the men of old, who fought before them under its colours. (Applause). There is no First among the regiments and Corps of my Army, and there is no Last. All are bound in the same spirit of brotherhood and proud service to Sovereign and Country and each regards itself with every reason as second to none. (Applause. 190 ft.)

C.U. Above all, the British Army has been famed throughout the world for it's - it's flourishing spirit of proud and willing service alike, in the barrack and on the battlefield. It's function has been to impose the way of peace. To spar the vanquished, and to battle down the proud. How well it is done, is recorded in the Annals of the Army, and by the honours on your colours. In the words of your great historian, Sir John Fortesque, who for many years, was librarian at Windsor Castle. The British Army will be remembered not for it's surpassing valor and indurance, not for it's countless deeds of daring and it's invincible stubbornness in battle, but for it's alliegiance in conquest and it's gentleness in domination.-(Quotation). I take great pride in the Army and in these words which I know to be a true now, as when they were written. (129 ft.) [Before I ask you to rise and to drink with me, the toast of the Army, I am sure that you will wish to join me in offering warm congratulations to the Chief of the Imperial Staff on his promotion to the Rank of Field-Marshal. (Loud applause). I now ask you to rise and drink the toast of the Army. "The Army".] (74 ft.) (Applause).
