

DULLES LAID TO REST:

In Washington National Cathedral lay the body of John Foster Dulles, lately American Secretary of State, architect of the Defence Policy of the Free World. His sorrowing widow came to the great church where a congregation of three thousand, included Soviet Foreign Minister Gromyko, among the diplomats of seventeen countries. Dr. Adenauer represented the West German Federal Republic.

Christian Herter, on whom the burden of Secretary of State now lies, was conspicuous among American Statesmen. A simple Presbyterian service was conducted in the Cathedral, and then the coffin was borne to the hearse. It was followed by the President and Mrs. Eisenhower.

Arlington National Cemetery awaited the cortege which was nearly a mile in length. No American Statesman since President Roosevelt had been accorded so impressive a funeral. For John Foster Dulles occupied a unique place in American affairs. That fact was attested by the presence of the foreign ministers, who had flown from Geneva to pay him their last tribute. As in the Cathedral, the ceremony at Arlington was moving in its simplicity. The coffin was placed in the shadow of a tree, near the grave of the unknown soldier.

President and Mrs. Eisenhower took their places, joined by the vice-president and Mrs. Nixon. Men rest at Arlington who in their lifetime strove valiantly for peace and freedom. A hero in the field of Statesmanship now lay in their company.
