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## U.S. ACTIVITIES ON MANY FRONTS.

### BUHA, (New Guinea)

American troops moving up along the North Shore of New Guinea near Buna to make contact with the Japs. A bomber selects its target and joins in the fighting as the Japs launch an attack in an attempt to extricate themselves from tight corner.

### NAPLES
